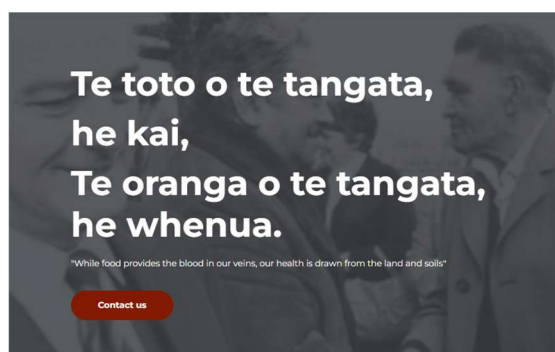

This year the Kohatu site here on the farm has undergone some restoration after storms hit earlier in the year.

The gardens and grounds have been given a major overhaul and clean-out with a trim back of some of the overgrown trees, gardens lined and dead foliage removed.

A new shelter and seating space has been erected with bad weather blowing over the old shelter that covered the signs. The decision was also made to keep the old truck on site, and we will be adding a small fence around it to keep visitors and children safe. New signage is in the process of being made but will be erected in the coming months.

Farm and Forest Update

As one year has come to an end and another is about to start, it has been a period of further buoyancy for the farming sector. The returns for the sheep, beef and dairy sectors are continuing to provide strong returns, and even the wool market has had some revival. This has come at a good time as the disruption overseas in recent months has meant that key inputs of fuel and fertiliser have increased significantly.

With lambing and calving in full swing on farm, we are hopeful for some more settled weather to ensure the

season gets off to a strong start. Even more important when there is the looming “el-nino” weather pattern that could impact on the summer rainfall and pasture supply. We are monitoring this and have options if this does eventuate.

Another big milestone achieved over the last year has been the refencing of the full boundary around Te Wharepapa (flax area). The old, original fence was at the end of its life, and it was important to protect this area and ensure that stock stayed out of it. This fencing came to a total of around \$69,000 but has been well worth it.

On the forestry note, a significant change is about to occur in the coming weeks with the formal sale of the forestry right from Manulife Forest Management to Rahiri Forestry Management Group. This change will mean a need to review the access and hunting agreements with the new entity so we will endeavor to keep you all updated as to what this means moving forward.

Rahiri will complete the harvest of the remaining 228ha of the forest and then be responsible for the replanting – all planned to be undertaken over the next year. At which time, the forest will officially be handed back to the Incorporation, in full.
